Territory Day is a celebration of self-government in the Northern Territory in 1978. As part of the celebrations, the sale and use of fireworks during Territory Day is allowed.



FOLLOW THESE SAFETY TIPS

Fireworks are dangerous and can cause serious injuries if not used properly.

- ★ Always read the safety labels and light one firework at a time.
- ★ Use a bucket of sand to stabilise fireworks or light them on a hard flat surface, especially multi-shot fireworks.
- ★ Light fireworks in a 10 metre diameter clear space and keep spectators a safe distance away.
- ★ Always supervise children and never give fireworks to children under 12.
- ★ Never hold fireworks in your hand as you let them off.
- ★ Never shoot or throw fireworks at other people, vehicles or structures.
- ★ Never light fireworks near or below trees, or near a building or anything else they could hit.
- ★ Never pick up or relight a dud firework, wait 20 minutes before wetting it down.



IF YOU LIGHT IT, FIGHT IT

It's easier to put out a fire as it starts.

- ★ Always have a hose or buckets of water or sand ready to put out any fire.
- ★ If the fire gets out of control, call 000.



APPLY THE 3Cs IF SOMEONE GETS BURNT

- ★ Cool it - under running water for 20 minutes.
- ★ Cover it - with cling wrap (eye pad or clean dressing if an eye injury).
- ★ Call 000 - for an emergency response.



IF YOU BLOW IT UP, CLEAN IT UP

Don't let fireworks debris spoil the Territory's beautiful parks and waterways.

- ★ Wet down all fireworks debris after use.
- ★ Put all fireworks debris in the bin.



INTERSTATE VISITORS

- ★ It is illegal to transport fireworks back to your home state or territory.
